

Keeping Our Children Safe

- 95 per cent of teens are online
- 77 per cent of teens have a smartphone
- Teens spend an average of 7½ hours a day connected
- 7.5 million Facebook users are under 13
 years old. *This goes against Facebook's Terms of Use*
- 32 per cent of kindergarten children are online daily

- Part of the Special Victims Unit that specializes in children and the Internet
- Member of the Provincial Strategy to protect children from sexual abuse and exploitation

What do investigators do?


- Child pornography track possession, distribution, accessing of child pornography to eliminate sources
- Online luring become undercover operators, do victim account takeover
- Peer to peer sharing
- Victim identification and investigation
- Categorization/cataloguing of seized images
- Assistance to victims of child pornography offences through Victim Services Unit, YRAP and boost.org



Victims without Borders

The Internet is global

Online child exploitation is global

- We collaborate with other police agencies worldwide
- Receive provincial grants for training and operations
- We participate in a worldwide database of seized images for court and identification purposes




Tactics and Ploys

Growing up is stressful enough.

Life is full of choices, sometimes kids don't make the right ones.

Do you provide an environment where mistakes can be prevented?





COMMON TACTICS

Used by Adult Offenders with Teenagers:

FLATTERY:	used particularly on girls in an effort to take advantage of the societal importance placed on female beauty
PITY:	used to encourage a sympathetic response from a teen and coerce her/him into feeling as if s/he is in a friendship or sexual relationship
SHARING SEXUALLY EXPLICIT MATERIAL:	used to normalize sexual activity and desensitize a teen to believe sexual activity with adults is okay
PERSISTENCE:	used to wear down a teen's personal boundaries, often under the guise that the adult will stop after the teen gives her/him what s/he wants (which is never the case)
UTTERING THREATS:	used to terrify a teen to comply with a request for sexual content

Educating Parents and Caregivers

Basic messaging

- Keep up with technology
- Keep up with your child
- Do not assume your children know more than you





TALK TO YOUR TEEN

and identify concerning behaviours that s/he should pay attention to such as:

- » Asking sexual or overly personal questions.
- » Sending or asking for sexual content (i.e. intimate pictures or videos).
- » Using pity/guilt to gain compliance.
- Using information shared in confidence to try to embarrass or hurt someone.
- » Offering someone money or gifts to do something s/he is uncomfortable with.
- » Not taking no for an answer (persistence).
- » Threats and blackmail.
